Ben Hoyt From IT to MyT: Finding software that fits your system

The explosion of online teaching has left many teachers trying to make sense of all the software options that are out there. Many of us worry that we're missing some new amazing tool or suffer because we're stuck with an app we wish we hadn't chosen. This talk offers some tips on how to keep track of all of the options, find applications that fit your needs and develop a toolbox that actually works for your situation while also saving time and energy.

Promoting collaboration and creativity and formative assessment using any device in and out of the classroom

In this workshop we will look at the following:

- Submitting hand written work as a multi-page PDF with Office Lens and marking it with written and audio feedback
- Use Seesaw to create and privately share multimedia content including screencasts and give written and audio feedback
- Use wheelofnames.com and autodraw.com to promote writing and speaking skills through random chunking
- Use Socrative to create self-marking vocabulary tests
- Use Quizizz for a range of interactive activities including audio questions for remote listening through gamification
- Using Google Forms to make self-marking quizzes

Urs Kalberer Speaking for elementary learners

This presentation offers you a selection of practical speaking activities that can be applied directly to your classroom. Our online session will reflect the general distinction of speaking into monologues and dialogues. We will progress from repetition/drill activities to freer forms of expression. Another feature will be a focus on how to foster fluency in speaking activities.

Develop your advanced students' reflective learning abilities in the virtual classroom

Use the flipped classroom to help your students develop good reading habits by reading the press regularly. In your virtual class, teach them techniques through text analysis to notice useful language and use online tools. Finish it off with a discussion in breakout rooms to practice the language they analysed.

Thom Kiddle (Sponsored by NILE) Professional development for teachers in an online setting

In the last few months many of us have had to rise to the challenge of teaching our courses remotely. As the world starts to loosen some of the strict measures that have been in place, the only thing we can be certain of is that the 'new normal' will not be exactly the same as the old normal. With institutions responding to the need for a much fuller online offering to support, enhance or replace their traditional face-to-face classes, what does that mean for us? What new skills do we need to best support our students? How can we continue to develop as professionals in this changing climate? Thom Kiddle, Director of NILE answers these and more questions in this ETAS-NILE collaborative webinar.

4a 13:30 – 14:30

Dina Blanco-loannou Discovering our Strengths. Spotting the 'golden seeds' of wellbeing.

Do you know what your core character strengths are? Would you like to find out? Founded in Positive Psychology and Wellbeing, a strengths approach explores our character strengths and how we can identify and use them to grow. In this session, you'll be introduced to a strengths based approach and go away with easily implemented practical applications adapted for the English Language classroom to support learners in finding their 'golden seeds' (Linley 2008).

Charlotte Murphy (Sponsored by Oxford University Press) Mediation in the English language classroom

This talk looks at what is meant by the term *mediation* and examines its increasingly important role in English language teaching. It shows how teachers can use the types of activities and strategies laid out in the CEFR to frame a broader picture of their students' proficiency: one that includes mediation skills. The talk looks at the benefits and challenges of incorporating mediation activities into the ELT classroom, and also demonstrates three practical ways of turning a mediation activity-type into a classroom task for the English lesson.

Alex Warren (Sponsored by National Geographic Learning) The Magic of Words – Enhancing Effective Vocabulary Learning & Teaching

There are a great many number of principles to consider when maximising vocabulary learning: the need to give it deliberate attention; the need to show how words do not exist in isolation, but in partnerships and the need for learners to work out meaning for themselves and to take ownership of newly learnt vocabulary. In this session we'll explore how National Geographic Learning's titles exploit these different principles to help make vocabulary learning and teaching more effective and develop greater language awareness.

He has spoken at conferences and run training courses in Europe, North America, South America, the Middle East, the Far East and Australasia. He was a member of the Ministerial Steering Group on languages for the UK coalition government and advised on the Linguanet Worldwide project for The Language Company. He created ICT activities for the new Institut Français, ALL and Network for Languages Primary French Project Niveau Bleu, Blanc and Rouge courses and was short-listed for a NAACE Impact Award in 2013 too. Joe supported the Erasmus Plus project Conflict to Cooperation with 5 European countries and is currently involved in the Supporting Schools Reform in Algeria project through the British Council. He was recently described in a Guardian article as an 'MFL guru' and 'the man behind the #mfltwitterati.'.

Ben Hoyt An experienced classroom and now online teacher, Ben Hoyt knows the challenges in today's educational environment first-hand. A background in computer animation and web publishing has given him a head start in navigating the software and app market. He has been speaking to teachers across Switzerland about pedagogy and technology for the last five years, and is the current ETAS Web Chair.
